
MCAP Mission – MCAP strengthens members' capacity to provide quality services and opportunities that empower individuals and families to achieve economic stability.

MCAP Network

MCAP makes up 19 Community Action Agencies (CAA) serving Maryland, Delaware, and the District of Columbia.

Community Action

A Community Action Agency (CAA) is a local organization with the mission of reducing poverty through locally designed and delivered programs and services, targeted to the specific needs of the community. In United States and the Community Action territories. Agencies (CAA) are local private and public non-profit organizations that carry out the Community Action Program (CAP), which was founded by the 1964 Economic **Opportunity Act** to fight poverty by empowering the poor as part of the War on Poverty. CAAs exist in virtually every county in the U.S., numbering more 1.000 nationwide.

CSBG

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) is a federally funded block grant in the Office of Community Services, Administration for Children and Families. United States Department of Health and Human Services that provides funds to support services that alleviate the causes and conditions of poverty in under resourced communities. Tribes. territories, and 1,000+ local Community Action Agencies provide CSBG funded services and activities including housing, nutrition, utility, and transportation assistance; employment, education, and other income and asset building services; crisis and emergency services; and community asset building initiatives, and more.

Over 9 million+ individuals are served by CSBG-funded programs annually.



Operations and Functions

Board of Directors (BOD)



The executive directors of member agencies become voting members of the MCAP BOD, which meets every other month and presents a unique networking opportunity for executive directors to share agency best practices, tips and concerns.

MCAP organizes the Maryland, D.C., & Delaware area's Human Services Conference every May, during Community Action Month. The conference, in addition to year-round training, provides endless professional development opportunities for agency staff of all levels of management and departments. The training provided by MCAP is distinct in that Community Action-specific updates are provided in addition to the human services training. The conference also creates an annual opportunity for other agency staff to share best practices, network with each other, and share agency training opportunities; particularly regarding staff that cannot attend national conferences.

The BOD is comprised of several sub committees that dive deeper into Community Action issues: Membership Committee, Executive Committee, Nominating Committee, Conference & T/TA Committee, Legislative Committee, and the Finance Committee. One committee in particular, the Legislative Committee, is an arena where executive directors can set the legislative priorities for Community Action Agencies and drive targeted initiatives to elected officials specific on behalf of all Community Action Agencies in the Maryland, D.C. & Delaware area.

BOD Meetings and Structure



MCAP host monthly BOD meetings every other month on Wednesday with dues-paying members. The locations and time vary, are set by the Executive Director and announced no later than two weeks prior to the meeting.

The goal is to have a quorum at each meeting which consists of 1/3 of total voting memberships. We currently have 19 members, and six members would establish a quorum.

Officers of the BOD consist of the President, Vice President., Secretary and Treasurer.

Regional Performance and Innovation Consortia (RPIC)—Region III



In 2011, the <u>Office of Community Services (OCS)</u>, as part of the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), established 11 RPIC in the nation to enhance state, regional, and national T/TA (training and technical assistance) strategy for collaboration, capacity-building and exemplary practices in the CSBG network.

MCAP is the lead organization for Region III which includes Maryland (DC & Delaware), West Virginia, Virginia, and Pennsylvania. The RPIC's consist of state associations grouped by regions.

MCAP hosts monthly calls with national partners to stay abreast of updates and current happenings within the network. State Associations also report out on these calls to update regional and national partners on proposed goals and objectives submitted in the RPIC proposal.

MCAP reports on progress of the above focus areas by submitting reports as the current RPIC lead and a final report at duration.

One in three families in the US does not have enough diapers to meet the needs of their babies and toddlers.

Diapers, alone, can cost 8% of a person's total income if they are making federal minimum wage, and parents and caregivers who do not have enough diapers often cannot drop their children off at child care.

Self-Sufficiency Standard




One in three families in the US does not have enough diapers to meet the needs of their babies and toddlers.

The Self-Sufficiency Standard is a measure that calculates how much income a family must earn to meet basic needs.

Along with The Self-Sufficiency Standard, MCAP is releasing an accompanied calculator tool. The online tool allows people to calculate how much income is required to support their unique living structure or family composition and where they live. Giving people the ability to privately self-assess their living conditions compared to the poverty level gives them the knowledge to start planning for a better future.
